6.3 Quality important strategies adopted by the Institution / Department for each of the following.

#### 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The college follows the curriculum provided by the RTM Nagpur University, Nagpur. The institution allows teachers to participate freely in curriculum development. Teachers are given daily diaries for each year. The diaries are checked by the Principal and Heads of Department on monthly basis. In some subjects, our faculty members are actively involved in Board of Studies and teacher associations for conducting workshop on curriculum development.

### 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

All the teachers are required to adhere to a teaching plan and the progress is monitored by the Principal and the IQAC. Assignments, Group Discussions, student interactive teaching, remedial classes are effectively used for student improvement. ICT enabled teaching programmes have been initiated to upgrade the teaching methodology. Many teachers have been awarded Ph.D. and some are still pursuing the same. Teachers are relieved, whenever necessary, for faculty development programmes, orientation and refresher courses.

### 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Teachers take periodic class tests for evaluating students throughout the year. The final examination is conducted by the university (twice a year in semester pattern).

#### 6.3.4 Research and Development

Many teachers are actively engaged in research work leading to publication in various journals. Major and Minor research projects are funded by UGC and DST. A large number of faculty members are Ph. D. supervisors. The college is a recognized research centre for Chemistry and Microbiology.

### 6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

The library is computerized. Inflibnet system has been started. Many reference books and journals are procured for the upgradation of the library. The office is also computerized and connected through wide area networking. All the departments are provided with computers and internet facility. The campus is under CCTV Surveillance.

### 6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The institution follows recruitment policy as per the university and the Government of Maharashtra rules and regulations. After the staff approval by the Government agency, the posts are advertised in the regional and national newspapers. The interview committee for the faculty is approved by the Vice- Chancellor of the University. The decision of the interview committee is final. To improve the quality of human resource, the faculty members are required to submit annual performance based appraisal (PBAS) form, as prescribed by the UGC and ratified by the University.
